In conversation about...Older Adult Caregivers to a Spouse in Active Cancer Treatment with Valentina Donison

Valentina Donison, RN is a second-year PhD student from the Lawrence S. Bloomberg Faculty of Nursing at the University of Toronto. She graduated with her BScN from Ryerson University in 2015 and Masters in 2018. She aims to pursue a career as an independent nursing researcher with a program of research focused on supporting and improving the quality of life of older adults with cancer.

Valentina kick-started our webinar series on September 21, 2021: The number of older adults diagnosed with cancer will double in the next 20 years. Spousal caregivers will provide the majority of care to these individuals living with cancer, despite being older adults themselves. Much is unknown about this group of caregivers, including aspects of caregiving like the type and amount of care they provide, the impact of caregiver burden on their own health, as well as what are the positive aspects of caregiving.

In conversation about...Using Computerized Simulation Technologies to quantify Nursing Workload During the COVID-19 Pandemic

Join us on November 5, 2021 at 1200-1300 for our second "In Conversation..." webinar with Dr. Sadeem Qureshi, Dr. Nancy Purdy and Dr. Sue Bookey-Bassett.

About the webinar: COVID-19 continues to take a significant toll on front-line healthcare professionals – especially nurses. Higher acuity levels among COVID-19 patients and increased IPAC precautions, such as donning and doffing PPE, have created additional work demands for these front-line healthcare professionals. Using discrete event simulation (DES) we explored and quantified the effects of varying COVID-19 policies on nurse workload and quality of care. Implications for nurse leaders and decision-makers will be presented.

Jessica Pimienta is a first year PhD Student with the Lawrence S. Bloomberg Faculty of Nursing. She received the NRIG New Member Award in 2019. Jessica's clinical background is in obstetrics and public health nursing, with a specific focus on women's health. She completed her Master of Nursing degree at Ryerson University, specializing in the field of Leadership in Healthcare Policy and Education.

Her thesis work examined perinatal healthcare for recent immigrant women during the three-month OHIP waiting period. Jessica looks forward to expanding her research interests in her doctoral work, which will focus on the relationships among social media influencers and pharmaceutical companies. She wishes to examine the ways that these interactions are regulated in the context of a country that bans direct-to-consumer advertising of prescription medicines.

After completing the PhD program, Jessica plans to pursue a program of research related to the social and commercial determinants of health, and complete research projects that critically approach the impact that the private sector has on public health.

UPCOMING OPPORTUNITIES



The Alzheimer Society of Canada has launched its competition for doctoral, postdoctoral new investigator operating grant and proof of concept grant. Funds available: varies across competition. Application deadline is November 5, 2021.



The Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council next Partnership Development Grant competition has a deadline of November 15, 2021. Funds available: \$75,000 to \$200,000. UofT researchers must submit their MRA to UofT and their full application on the SSHRC online portal by Wednesday November 10, 2021 (12 noon). Those who would like an editorial review must email their material to the Editorial Officer, Gabrielle sugar by Monday, October 18, 2021. The next Partnership Engage Grant application deadline is December 15, 2021; UofT applicants must submit their MRA to UofT and full application to the SSHRC portal by December 10, 2021. Funds available: \$7,000 to \$25,000.



The Alpha Phi Foundation's women's heart health Heart to Heart grant has an application deadline of November 5, 2021 (UofT applicants have an internal MRA deadline of November 3, 2021).



Pfizer's competitive grants program is requesting proposals for the non-alcoholic steatohepatitis (NASH) ASPIRE program. The main areas of priority are improving models of care in patients with NASH and evidence generation of optimal management of NASH in various populations; innovations in use o non-invasive tools in care of patients with NAFLD; and understanding biological drivers of heterogeneity in disease pathogenesis and/or progression and regression in NASH. Letter of intent deadline is October 20, 2021, with full proposal deadline(by invitation) due March 8, 2022.



PThe New Frontiers in research Fund Transformation Competition is now open. Notice of intent to apply deadline is November 2, 2021; letter of intent to apply deadline is January 11, 2022; and full application deadline is September 20,2022. This funding opportunity supports large-scale Canadian-led interdisciplinary research projects that address a major challenge with the potential to realize real and lasting change. Funds available: Grants are between \$2,000,000 and \$4,000,000 per year (including indirect costs) for six years.
