CONFERENCE AWARDS

Genevieve Armstrong

NRIG Conference Award (\$750)

Genevieve Armstrong is a Professor in Nursing at Humber College and a PhD Candidate, collaborative in nursing and global health, at the University of Toronto. She was a former Public Health Nurse in the Tuberculosis (TB) Program at Toronto Public Health for over 10 years, and has also contributed to TB care nationally and internationally in Iqaluit, Nunavut, and in Barcelona, Spain. Passionate about health equity and social justice, her PhD thesis examines how access to TB diagnosis and treatment can be improved for migrants with a precarious immigration status in Canada, through equitable TB policies and practices.



Description of Research Project

Poor tuberculosis (TB) outcomes among migrants with a precarious immigration status (e.g., undocumented migrants) are driven by inequitable TB policies that affect migrants' access to care and do not address their social determinants of health. The purpose of my critical qualitative study is to assess the development and operationalization of TB policies and practices using an equity-oriented lens with regard to precarious migrants in three Canadian provinces, and identify potential solutions to improve current TB policies. Data will be collected via individual interviews with policy makers and implementers. Knowledge will be mobilized through an executive summary of recommendations to be shared with the Provincial and Federal Ministers of Health.

Intention of Funds

I have used the funds to support my attendance at the 2024 Tuberculosis Conference in Baltimore, Maryland. Attending the conference afforded me with the opportunity to disseminate my preliminary study findings from my PhD thesis, and network.

GRADUATE AWARDS

Jessica Ackerman

NRIG Graduate Award (\$1000)

Jessica Ackerman is a first year PhD student (Nursing) at McMaster University and a Research Trainee within the PROTECT virtual care lab at Hamilton Health Sciences. Clinically, Jessica is a Registered Nurse in the Emergency Department at Sunnybrook Health Sciences Center and a sessional faculty instructor at Humber College.

Description of Research Project

Jessica's doctoral research focuses on the design of virtual care and remote monitoring technologies for the improvement of care delivery in patients diagnosed with metastatic breast cancer. Breast cancer is the most common cancer in Canadian women and up to 10% of these women are diagnosed with metastatic breast cancer. Once diagnosed, patients are placed on cyclin-dependent kinase 4/6 inhibitors (an oral anticancer agent) as first-line therapy which can lengthen overall survival and progression-free survival rates but place a profound burden on patient's physical and psychological well-being. Despite receiving a terminal diagnosis, patients are faced with maintaining their quality of life that is often plagued with frequent surveillance monitoring, multiple hospital visits, overcrowded outpatient clinics, long travel and geographical barriers, across centres. This can result in fragmented care delivery and unmet healthcare needs such as poor symptom control, reduced medication adherence, lack of timely communication with their oncology teams and minimal support along the cancer care continuum. The aim of Jessica's multi-phased research study is to co-design a novel, hospital-to-home virtual care system that will target the multifaceted nature of metastatic breast cancer and provide a more comprehensive, innovative approach to cancer care delivery for this population. This award will allow for Jessica and her team to purchase data analytic and review software for the first phase of her study.

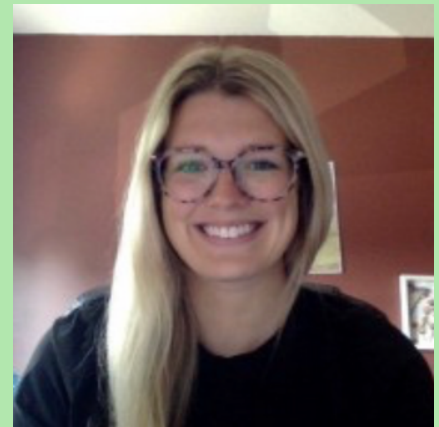

Madison Basso

NRIG New Member Award (\$500)

Given the challenges in the nursing practice environment, particularly due to the COVID-19 pandemic, it is anticipated that nursing students may face occupational demands that they are not confident in their ability to manage. It is also expected that nursing students' perception of their ability to cope with occupational demands may impact their professional intent. My research project aims to explore how Ontario baccalaureate nursing students' occupational coping self-efficacy influences their professional intentions. This includes their plans to practice as Registered Nurses, their preferred clinical practice setting, and their interest in pursuing further education. The NRIG New Member Award will support this research by offloading the costs of purchasing statistical analysis software and publication fees.



Ovesiri Fueta

NRIG New Member Award (\$500)

My name is Ovesiri Fueta, I am an MScN student at UWO interested in digital health as well as a nurse informaticist at London Health Sciences Centre. My research project is to evaluate how a recently implemented digital health tool known as Health Information Exchange (HIE) impacts emergency department nurses and physician workflows. HIE platforms have been implemented in various countries to improve interoperability. To improve interoperability of our systems, Ontario Health has implemented the Ontario eHub HIE which serves as a repository for long term care and tertiary centres to send and receive information. This allows for information sharing across electronic health records reducing information silos across organizations and health care settings. As part of my study, I intended to use the funds as incentives for my participants.

NEW MEMBER AWARDS

Katherine De Lucia

NRIG New Member Award (\$500)

I am a registered nurse with a background in public health nursing, currently pursuing a Master of Science in Nursing degree at Western University, entering my second year. My master's thesis focuses on evaluating an outpatient clinical program for stroke patients. Professionally, I am dedicated to advancing my research in clinical program evaluations, with a future focus on expanding my research to include a diverse range of clinical programs and services.



Description of Research Project

There is limited research evaluating interventions offered through outpatient stroke rehabilitation programs, making it challenging to assess their role and value within stroke rehabilitation as a whole. This study aims to evaluate a six-week virtual memory training program offered through an outpatient stroke rehabilitation program in London, Ontario. It seeks to better understanding virtual memory training program goals, intended outcomes, implementation challenges, strengths, and areas for program improvement and expansion through the perspectives of program providers and administrators. The potential research findings aim to inform decision-making for program implementers, enhance service delivery, program logistics, and patient outcomes.

Award Intention

The money from the RNAO NRIG New Member Award will go towards paying for expenses related to research conferences where I will be presenting my research findings. I plan to attend the GTA Best Practices Day for Rehabilitation held annually in May (2025) in Toronto, Ontario. This award will help cover the cost of conference registration and travel to and from the conference through ViaRail. Remaining funds will finance other future conferences and presentations that I plan to attend.

NRIG PhD Award (\$3000)

Ainsley Miller is a PhD Candidate in the Health Sciences program at Lakehead University. Ainsley has professional experience working in the ICU. More recently, Ainsley has been teaching full-time as a Lecturer with Lakehead University's School of Nursing

Christine Garinger

NRIG PhD Award (\$3000)

I am a CNA certified Community Health Nurse and hold a Masters degree in Health Information Science from Western University. I am in the PhD program at the Arthur Labatt Family School of Nursing at Western University. My study uses a qualitative Interpretive Description approach to explore how Registered Nurses, in diverse practice settings and roles, enact nursing advocacy with and for women who experience interpersonal violence. I have enjoyed over 2 decades of direct nursing practice focused on adolescent and adult psychiatry and crisis intervention and the health impacts of trauma, substance use and violence against women. My indirect nursing practice has included program evaluation of community health programs, management and leadership roles, and educating and mentoring students and new professionals. Funds from the NRIG award will be used to support travel and other expenses focused on knowledge mobilization of findings such as conferences, publications and an end of study forum.



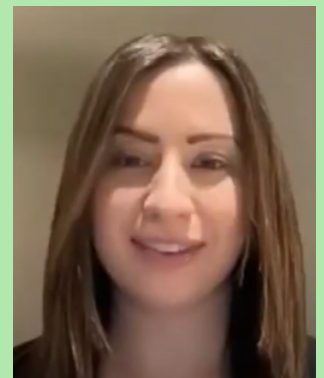

Jessica Mor

NRIG PhD Runner-Up Award (\$1250)

Jessica Mor is a PhD Candidate within the Lawrence Bloomberg Faculty of Nursing at the University of Toronto, a Research Coordinator within the Daphne Cockwell School of Nursing at Toronto Metropolitan University, and a Registered Nurse. Her clinical background is in obstetrics and public health nursing. Jessica's doctoral research focuses on the role of private companies in fostering partnerships between patient advocates and the pharmaceutical and health sectors. Her work delves into the impact of these collaborations on patient engagement in policy processes. She is pioneering the mapping of an emerging industry dedicated to addressing the need for patient representation in policy decision-making about drugs. This qualitative project will utilize three forms of data: 1) publicly available documents from companies who facilitate the sharing of patient experiences; 2) participant interviews with company employees; and 3) observation of relevant industry and policy events. Jessica will be using the funds from this award to subscribe to premium memberships, such as LinkedIn and Crunchbase, to facilitate the document analysis phase of the study. This award will also assist with compensating participants for participating in interviews and procuring the services of a transcriptionist to transcribe interviews.

INNOVATION & DEVELOPMENT AWARDS



Simon Donato-Woodger

NRIG Innovation & Development Award (\$1000)

Simon Donato-Woodger is a nurse in the Intensive Care Unit. In his application he described his involvement in a Quality Improvement (QI) project that is part of a larger Registered Nurses' Association of Ontario Advanced Clinical Practice Fellowship. This project is evaluating the impact of Wound Care Champion (WCC) staff on adherence to the pressure ulcer risk and reduction care bundle, as well as the rates of Hospital-Acquired Pressure Injuries within the ICU. This project has been underway since May 29th, 2023 and is currently being evaluated for sustainability. His goals include compiling and publishing the results in a reputable nursing journal, such as the Journal of Wound, Ostomy, and Continence Nursing. He is also scheduled to present the findings of this project in a poster format, at the Canadian Association of Critical Care Nurses' Annual Conference in Regina, Saskatchewan in September 2024.
