Palliative Care Advocacy at Queens Park – Compassionate Care Act Mahoganie Hines, BScN, RN, CHPCN(C)

The Compassionate Care act is one of the very few private member's bills that have passed and became law. I have had the privilege to speak to the need for equitable palliative and end of life care in Ontario twice at Queen's park regarding this bill, now act. For those of you who know me or have met me know that advocacy is a huge part of my nursing practice and speaking to this act was no different. The initial time I attended Queen's park to speak, I was able to attend in person in 2018, prior to the bill's first reading in legislature. The second time I was asked to speak was in Fall of 2020 prior to the bill's third and final reading before reaching royal assent. At the first reading I spoke to the need for equitable access to excellent palliative and end of life care as well as the fact

that palliative care access is an issue of the public's health. During the meeting prior to the third and final

reading, I spoke about my own experience and the inequities of palliative care in various care areas from my personal experience of my loved one who recently had died. This was an amazing opportunity to see the political process and be part of the unified voices bringing forward issues and needs within palliative care.

PCNIG Involvement in Bill C-7 - MAiD

On February 24th, 2020, the federal government tabled Bill C-7, in response to a landmark court ruling in Quebec last fall. Following delays because of COVID-19 and the proroguing of government, the same legislation was re-tabled on October 5, 2020. This legislation proposes broadening the 2016 law on medical assistance in dying to include those whose death is not "reasonably foreseeable," and allowing for waiver of final consent. Specifically, the amendments would:

- Permit assisted dying for those whose death is not reasonably foreseeable, by removing this criterion from the eligibility requirements.
- Make changes to the safeguards for those whose death is foreseeable, requiring only one independent witness, providing for the waiver of final consent and dropping the requirement for a 10-day reflection period.
- Add safeguards for those whose death is not reasonably foreseeable.
- Add an explicit exclusion for patients with irremediable mental illness.

As part of RNAO's ongoing role in policy and political advocacy, RNAO was granted standing to present at the parliamentary hearings to review Bill C-7. <u>Click the link to see</u> what RNAO presented which reflects input from your executive and the membership of the PCNIG.

Being a nursing student during a pandemic...

Nursing school has always been challenging on both academic and mental levels, but these obstacles are amplified and heightened during the COVID-19 pandemic.

In January 2020, we would not have believed that in just a few short months the world was going into lockdown and that we would be sent home to learn clinical skills in our rooms. A full year later, nursing students enter the clinical environment to not only learn, but to supplement staff, hospital overflow and the nurses' burnout amidst a deadly virus. Working with tiny needles, precise medication orders and limited time, are skills that are hard enough to learn in a controlled environment, but during a pandemic we have to factor in PPE. This may not seem like a big deal, but doing your first injection wearing a raincoat of a gown, foggy face shield, and thick gloves can make it near impossible. Alternatively, we are offered a virtual clinical placement online without the opportunity to practice and implement skills with real patients.

The usual challenges of academia are compounded by the realities of the pandemic. New barriers are popping up in nursing students' lives every day, sometimes Covid-19 scares that threaten clinical placement, or not being able to see your family or friends for months on end, or trying to stay motivated and connected to classes while attending via a computer screen. This year feels like mental health is a tightrope on which we are teetering from side to side, trying to maintain some balance.

This is the truth about becoming a nurse during a pandemic. Would we do it again? In a heartbeat. Because we all chose this path for a reason, to help people in their most vulnerable moments. Because compassion and hard work run in our veins. Because we are future nurses.
